- 6. To establish a strong foundation in Basic Sanskrit Grammar, covering Sanskrit Varnamala, basic sandhi rules, and the ability to read Sanskrit literature, facilitating effective comprehension and interpretation.
- 7. To equip students with essential language skills and grammatical knowledge necessary for engaging with Sanskrit texts, laying the groundwork for further exploration and appreciation of the rich Sanskrit literary tradition.

Justification for the mapping

PO1 Research-Related Skills

CO2 Students can apply critical thinking skills to analyze and interpret classical Sanskrit texts, such as Pandurangashtakam Stotra, 'Gajastatra Na Hanyate,' and 'Goutamasya Chaturyam.' Demonstrate an informed awareness of ethical and moral issues embedded in these texts.

CO4 Students are motivated to ask the questions and discuss the various topics related to text in the classroom. This enhances the ability to go deeper in the problem to find the answer and this habit develops a sense of inquiry and research aptitude.

PO2 Effective Citizenship and Ethics

CO2 Students learn philosophical concepts from Pandurangashtakam and learn ethics through the panchatantra stories.

PO3 Social competence

CO1 Reflection of Ancient Indian Society can be seen in the Vedas. Knowing about vedas makes students understand the roots of Indian society, which helps to know the current social issues in a better way.
